New College Village Building Project Update



The much talked about New College Village (NCV) is rising above the ground and will be open for semester 1 2009. The NCV will be the most significant postgraduate accommodation built in Australia and is the most ambitious project initiated by any not-for-profit organization at an Australian university in decades. The new 319-bed building will offer UNSW a unique postgraduate residential community.

Students will choose between self-contained studios with their own kitchenette and ensuite, or their own room with ensuite in multi-bedroom (5 or 6) apartments. New College Village will have many shared spaces designed to facilitate community, residents will share 2 common rooms on each level, a rooftop terrace, a large ground floor games room, a business centre, convenience store, reading room, 2 outdoor courtyards and BBQ facilities, as well as a large ground floor main common room and formal meeting rooms. The building will be the first accommodation on campus that is air-conditioned and has all ensuite bedrooms.

New College Village will provide strong

community life and support, with residential staff consisting of Senior Residents offering pastoral care and academic support and a live-in Dean. Applications are now being accepted for accommodation in 2009. The University of New South Wales has significant on campus accommodation needs. In the 2020 Campus Master Plan it was suggested that there was a need to create an additional 3000 beds. New College Village will help to meet this need, providing a considerable increase in the current on campus residential population at the University of New South Wales.

On February 12, 2008 a Foundation Stone ceremony officially marked the commencement of construction which began in August 2007. The Vice-Chancellor and President of the University of NSW, Professor Frederick G Hilmer AO, unveiled the Foundation Stone for New College Village.

This is a very important development for UNSW. It is aligned with our strategic directions and we are grateful to New College for its initiative.

At the launch Professor Hilmer expressed his ringing endorsement for the project, highlighting its importance in supporting the University's current strategies and direction. Amongst other things in his keynote address the Vice-Chancellor commented: "This is a very important development for UNSW. It is aligned with our strategic directions and we are grateful to New College for its initiative."

Speaking as one of the founders of New College, Emeritus Professor Edwin Judge commented that:

The driving force fifty years ago (for the New College vision) ... came from Lawrie and Alison Lyons ... I recall tramping over disused tram-tracks at Randwick (one of the first options for the location of New College). The University also offered an old racecourse beyond Kingsford ... But it was the tenacity of the Lyons’s in dealing with the Vice-Chancellor of the time that enabled us to hold out for at least a toehold on the Kensington campus proper. This is the site we are on today.

The NCV is a continuation of the vision and work of the inspirational founders group that began in 1955, of which Lawrie and Alison Lyons and Edwin Judge were members.

What will the NCV community be like?

New College Village will be a strong and supportive community that is driven by the same priorities and goals as the original New College. While it will serve postgraduate students it will seek to:

- ▶ provide strong pastoral care;
- ▶ significant academic support through residential staff;
- ▶ offer rich social and cultural activities;

- ▶ provide numerous links between residents and the University community;
- ▶ connect residents to a wider network of relationships on the campus and within the community through an active fellows program.

To shape the community the current Master will live with his wife Carmen in the building and lead the residential program.

New Collegian changing the climate

Alumnus Dr Stephen Cornelius (New College 1993-1996) participated in the December 2007 UN Convention on Climate Change meeting in Bali. Employed by the British Government he is involved in International climate change negotiations. Here he updates us on his contribution.

From New College to Bali

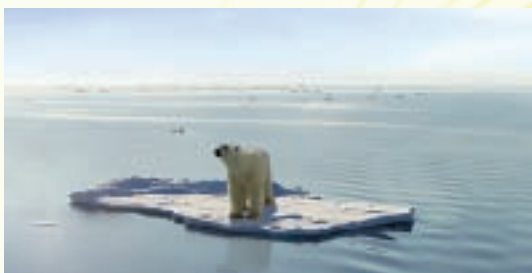


Friends from New College days – for me twelve years ago now – can have a profound impact on our lives. I attribute my current

job, working in international climate change negotiations for the British Government, to a reunion with a dozen or so New Collegians around Oxford in the spring of 2004. I'd been looking for a new job and a chat with Jo Halliday (New College 1996-1997) eventually led to us being colleagues at the UK Environment Ministry (DEFRA) working on climate change mitigation.

I left Australia with my brand-new passport straight after completing a Chemical Engineering degree at UNSW – the option of working in a mine in the middle of Western Australia didn't appeal as much as further study overseas. Over the next three years I completed a PhD on modelling and control of pollution from cars at the Control Engineering Department of Cambridge University. I then worked for three years as an automotive engineering consultant in the UK and Japan – mainly designing computer models of car exhaust systems. It was then I had a few drinks in Oxford and everything changed because of my New College network.

Currently my main role is to support the negotiations on further action under the Kyoto Protocol and as such I was part of the UK delegation at the 2007 United Nations Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) meeting in Bali. For me there were two highlights of the Bali conference, the first was hearing Kevin Rudd



announce Australia was ratifying the Kyoto Protocol. I believe that Australia has done the right thing in committing to the Kyoto Protocol – it is important for developed countries to show leadership – only this way will we build enough trust for developing countries to take on stronger and binding commitments of their own. The second was being in the room in the drama-filled final (extra) day as the agreement to negotiate the follow-on of the Kyoto Protocol over the next two years finally came together after the delegate from Papua New Guinea told the United States to lead or get out of the way.

I've been involved with the IPCC since starting at DEFRA and so was excited when the organisation was jointly awarded the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize with Al Gore.

Working in climate change is challenging and exciting. The current media spotlight in the UK means I'm working in the most topical and talked about area in the country – it also means there is never a time to rest. I've been involved with the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) since starting at DEFRA and so was excited when the organisation was jointly awarded the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize with Al Gore (according to our Minister I can claim a tiny fraction of it). I represented the UK at IPCC meetings last year to agree on the "summary for policy-makers" of the Fourth Assessment Report with all the other IPCC member countries (if you want to know more about climate change then read this report).

2008 will be important and exciting in the world of climate change – the main task is to work on the so called Bali Action Plan to determine what the second commitment under the Kyoto Protocol will look like. It seems that returning to Australia is still a couple of years off (as it has been now for the last seven). **Steven Cornelius** ▶

New's 104 new residents haven't wasted any time getting involved in College life. 101 positions on sub-committees have been filled by our newest residents (some opting to be on more than one sub-committee) and the cast of the play for 2008 (*Cosi* by Louis Nowra) is dominated by new faces.

Compared to previous intakes more of them come from NSW country and the ACT than in previous years (71 or 68.3%) with a few from Sydney (6), interstate (15) and overseas (12). Perhaps more surprising,

though, is that for the first time (at least since 2002) the number of people studying Arts related courses (Arts, Social Science, International Studies, CoFA courses and Built Environment courses) is more than the number of people studying engineering (38 compared with 27 engineering students). As well as the number of Arts students we also have a larger number of law students and commerce students this year. The number of law students in the building has jumped from 7 to 16 as a result of the new intake and the number of commerce students has jumped from 11 to 25.

There are many outstanding students in terms of their academic performance and their involvement in the leadership at their school. One of our new residents has already set up his own charity having worked as a consultant on ethics for different businesses after only three years out of school. Another student was school captain and sports captain as well as having achieved a near perfect UAI – an all rounder in every sense of the word. At least 24 were dux of their school, 9 were school captains and at least 21 achieved a UAI over 99 (two received a UAI of 100). Many of our residents received significant scholarships. One of our new residents is a Scientia scholar, one received the Malcolm Chaiken Scholarship, 13 from NSW received AAA scholarships, 4 are Co-op scholars and 4 have Rural Engineering Scholarships. Many speak different languages including Mandarin (7), French (4), German (3), Japanese, Cantonese and Latin (2 each) and at least one new resident speaks Italian and Spanish. They have won many prizes for their efforts at school and beyond. One of our new residents was one of only 12 recipients

in Queensland of the Peter Doherty prize for excellence in Science. Another has received the Order of Australia Association Medallion for her long list of community involvements, while eleven have received medallions for their involvement in the Duke of Edinburgh scheme.

Our new residents bring with them a wealth of experience in different activities within the community. As was the case in previous years there are a large number of residents who found out about New College at the National Youth Science Forum (12 residents). As well as NYSE, however, our new residents have also had experience working with local youth councils, Arts councils, Amnesty International, missions to the homeless, Habitat for Humanity, Sunday School teaching, Lifeline, Leo Clubs, Antipodeans, community radio stations, UN Youth association, community art workshops, Engineers without Borders, leading church youth groups, Micah Challenge, Make Poverty History campaign, House of Welcome, Red Cross in the Northern Territory, Interact, Zonta, surf life saving clubs, Young Endeavour program and World Vision conferences. Our new residents join us well equipped with the skills, talents, experience and enthusiasm to work alongside other members of the College community who are like minded in their desire to make a difference in the wider world. ▀

Major New College awards at 2007 Valedictory dinner

The Valedictory Dinner in late 2007 provided the College community with the opportunity to recognise outstanding achievement in different spheres of College life. Sporting awards, service awards and the major awards such as Collegian of the Year and the New College Award were presented to Collegians who, each in their own way, have given of their time and energy to make New College a special place where there is a strong sense of community and commitment to working together to achieve great things.

Service awards were presented to five Collegians for their contribution to College life across a range of different areas: Pete Thompson, Chris Bailey, Nicole Orenstein, Jay Davey and Nathan Symonds.

The recipient of the Mick Braund Award in 2007 was Sarah Zardawi. The Mick Braund Award is the top NCSA award for community and social service in the College, named in memory of New Collegian Mick Braund who tragically died in a car accident in 1982. Sarah Zardawi has been a true servant of others ever since she arrived at the beginning of 2004. In 2006 she was a producer for the Revue and in that same year set up the Duke of Edinburgh scheme at New College – the only tertiary institution to be involved in this program. Sarah worked on maintaining this program in 2007 and was also active in raising awareness within the community about indigenous health and poverty further afield.

The 2007 Valedictory Dinner was a wonderful evening of reflecting on the contributions of many Collegians who have exemplified the first ideal of the College mission – collegiality.

The NCSA's top award is the Collegian of the Year Award which was awarded to Scott Parlett. Despite a number of injuries Scott remained committed to sport throughout the year in College and displays the legendary New College spirit in relation to every sport that is played. He was also one of the people behind the Close the Gap initiative aimed at raising awareness of the gap in life expectancy between indigenous and non-indigenous Australians, as well as being a member of various sub-committees in 2007 in College. involved in nearly everything that College had to offer in 2007.

In 2007 the person who received the New College Award (Service to the Community) was Kim Hoa Scruton. In 2007 Kim Hoa was a Resident Adviser following on from her work as President of the NCSA in 2006. As President she achieved much on behalf of the community, not least of which was providing support for the College's first musical.

The 2007 Valedictory Dinner was a wonderful evening of reflecting on the contributions of many Collegians who have exemplified the first ideal of the College mission – that of collegiality. It was a great reminder of what lies at the heart of New College – that sense of community and belonging that inspires individuals to give of themselves for the sake of others. ▀

New College academic excellence

Summary of 2007 academic results

In Session One 28 residents achieved a high distinction average and 95 achieved a distinction average or higher. Of the 217 people for whom results were available, therefore, 44% achieved a distinction average and 12.9% achieved a high distinction average. In Session Two results were similar. 28 people achieved a high distinction average and 99 achieved a distinction average. Results were available for 240 residents with 41.3% achieving a distinction average and 11.7% achieving a high distinction average. The average mark across the College in Session One was 72% and 70% in Session Two.

Stuart Barton Babbage Fellow update



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A team of First year UNSW Civil and Environmental Engineering students won the prestigious national “2007 Engineers without Borders Challenge” and travelled to India to experience engineering in a developing region. The team, known as “The Planetears” was led in their project by coordinator, Bec Barnes (current Stuart Barton Babbage Fellow).

“I love the fact that the research is intensely practical” Rebecca says. “I think God’s got me here for a reason – I’ve always prayed a great deal for South-East Asia and I expect these PhD years will prove really useful if/when God sends me to serve there.” Rebecca has been using her additional university years to cultivate a generation of young engineers eager to use their skills in developing regions.

She has been lecturing first year students on ‘Engineering in Development Work’ and coordinated a team of first-year Civil and Environmental Engineering UNSW students, who won the prestigious national “2007 Engineers Without Borders Challenge”. In 2007, its inaugural year, the Challenge attracted 3500 participants from 20 universities. The UNSW team designed a water,

wastewater and sanitation system for an orphanage in India. They have recently returned from India, where they learnt about development work first-hand and visited the orphanage for which they were designing.

“It is time for us to be educating our engineering students on using their skills where the need is greatest”, says Rebecca. “The technologies and techniques for supplying water, sanitation, and other life-giving infrastructure to developing regions are known in theory, but there’s a great shortage of engineers who are able and willing to do it in practice. It’s time to raise a generation of young engineers with a passion for getting their hands dirty in developing regions.”

As the Stuart Barton Babbage Fellow, Rebecca has lived in the College as she completes her PhD and has been an academic role model for residents as well as offering personal support to people as she interacts with

them. She has also encouraged, mentored, trained and assisted new undergraduate student residents with the challenges of academic life. Remaining highly involved in College life she has specifically mentored all honours students in the building.

“My New College friends from my undergraduate years have scattered to the four corners of the earth and, I believe, are fast becoming world leaders”, says Rebecca. “It’s a privilege to come back to New and meet some more stars before God sends me away too. We’re an eclectic bunch of out-of-the-ordinary people, who are good at celebrating the out-of-the-ordinariness in each other.”

term involvement with New College. It acknowledged his contribution to the shaping of the culture of New College that has made such a significant contribution to campus life. It also acknowledged his

Dr Babbage addressed the graduands, their parents and families on this occasion. In the words of the Master Trevor Cairney who attended to participate as a staff member and Dr Babbage's guest:

"It was a wonderful graduation ceremony and a fitting acknowledgment of Stuart's outstanding contribution to the College and the University. His address was inspirational. Its theme was unity in diversity and provided an overview of Australian and world history of racism and sectarian conflict. He recognised the Rudd government's apology to the Stolen Generation and spoke of the place it will hopefully play in redressing our nation's history of racism as demonstrated in previous Indigenous policy and indeed the White Australia policy. He suggested that 'contrition, or penitence, is the precondition to healing, and the path to forgiveness and reconciliation'. It was a memorable address delivered with Stuart's usual passion, word craft and gravitas." Congratulations Dr Babbage. ▀

Where are they now?

Douglas Swinbourne (New College 1969-1974)



Douglas graduated from UNSW with BSc (Hons I) and PhD in metallurgy. Douglas joined New College in its first year. "I was there before the undergraduates (I was a postgraduate then) and so there were only about 5-6 residents when I joined. The

place was still being finished off by the builders ... for a few weeks we had no washing machines, TV etc. I remember one night at formal dinner we were served beef, and were all surprised to find it riddled with shotgun pellets! Somebody had used the poor cow for target practice. Formal dinners had good speakers, but often we couldn't hear them well so the Master installed a radio microphone system. Unfortunately it was tuned to the same frequency as the Ambulance Service so when he turned it on, all we got were ambulance messages – loud and clear. The large room on the ground floor beside the dining room was our TV room – and from there I watched Neil Armstrong walk on the moon ... the Master was Noel Pollard and the Dean was Phil Grouse, both very fine men. Phil especially suffered from the noise from Anzac Parade so he

bought a white noise generator. When you walked into his flat the hissing noise was weird, but after a few minutes you ignored it and it did cover the traffic noise." Douglas has worked at RMIT since 1981. He is currently Head of Chemical Engineering, and will relinquish this position in 2008.

Richard Fleming (New College 2002-2005)

Richard visited Australia in April 2008 after his Australian Youth Ambassadors for Development (AYAD) program 12 month assignment ended. Richard put together a quote for his time in Bangladesh that he shared: "From being a Bangladeshi celebrity one moment to getting mugged at knife-point the next – Bangladesh has been an exhilarating experience for me, an experience that I already look back on with much fondness."
