New College actively contributes to the life of the wider University and its main campus is set within University grounds. New College Postgraduate Village was opened in 2009 and is home for postgraduates and selected senior undergraduates. New welcomes people of all faiths and none. The College celebrates, and is enriched by, the diversity of backgrounds of its staff and students. The College pursues academic excellence, collegiality and service to society founded upon Christian faith and values.

The College's main programs include:

- New College, the residential college for 248 undergraduate students at the University of New South Wales
- New College Postgraduate Village, the residential village for 315 postgraduate and senior undergraduate students at the University of New South Wales.
- The Centre for Christian Apologetics, Scholarship and Education (CASE), a specialist centre which carries out Christian apologetics—the activity of defending the Christian faith, engaging with other world views and attracting 'thinking' people to the message of the Christian faith.

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A Message from the Master



Our colleges leave a clear imprint on everyone who is associated with us. Principally, I think that this imprint is at least a confidence to engage with large numbers of people we may not have met before.

ver the past four years, I have been in a number of new social situations with collegians and alumni. I have been delighted to observe the confidence with which they contribute to social settings to involve new people and set them at ease.

This has been particularly evident through our anniversary celebrations in our 50th and 10th years. Every event that I have been involved with has reflected both a warm rekindling of friendships as well as greeting and making new friends between alumni of different eras.

Ruth and I would like to take this opportunity to express our sincere thanks to all alumni for the warmth and kindness with which we have been greeted during our anniversary events. Our alumni are all an impressive bunch!

One of the questions that continues to be raised in my discipline, Engineering, is as follows: "Why have we struggled to develop an Australian entrepreneurial culture similar to that characteristic of the United States?"

My view, after two and a half years as Master, is that university colleges are a significant contributor to national entrepreneurial culture. Australia does not have the developed university college culture of the United States. Colleges provides university students, at the outset of their careers, with the social and business networks from which such entrepreneurship thrives. Consequently, University colleges play a critical national role in formation and the development of multidisciplinary intellectual cohorts.

The transition of UNSW to a three-term academic year has presented many challenges but also a special opportunity for our colleges, in partnership with alumni, to significantly accelerate this aspect of our life together.

This year, I have been keen to suggest to alumni that they might seek opportunities to take on outstanding UNSW students for internships, a term at a time. Of course, I am confident that our present residents will continue to demonstrate that they are the outstanding cohort at UNSW. From my experience as an engineering manager, internships are excellent way of determining whether potential graduates are suitable for ongoing employment.

I am pleased to say that since the beginning of the year, I have had a trickle of enquiries from alumni about these possibilities. I am presently aiming to develop this conversation over the coming months and years.

As I keep saying to anyone who I meet associated with our colleges, please stay in touch and feel welcome to join us for lunch whenever you might have opportunity to do so. As New 'n' Old continues to record, the lives of our collegians are fascinating and impressive. It is always a pleasure for me to hear of your latest exploits.

1969-74 Alumni Afternoon Tea and Campus Tour

ome of the original UNSW buildings that existed on the Kensington campus when New College opened in 1969 still stand, although they've been jazzed up a little and are no longer surrounded by rolling green fields. However, for the most part, the campus is markedly changed with at least one new building seeming to pop up every year. New College Master, Adjunct Prof. Bill Peirson, took alumni for a guided tour of the Kensington campus, New College and to New College Postgraduate Village on the Friday afternoon.

Following the College and Campus Tour, alumni from the 1969-74 period delighted in sharing an afternoon tea together in the College courtyard. The afternoon tea sought to honour our alumni who lived at New College during its foundation years from 1969 (the first year men were admitted) through to 1974 (the first year women were officially admitted). Partners and families of these alumni were also welcome, and people had the opportunity to step back in time while perusing decades worth of photos and artefacts on display. Special speeches were given by alumna Lis Taylor, one of the first women to live at New College, and alumnus A/Prof William Emilsen, one of our original 1969 cohort. Reflections from one of the College's first female residents

The following speech was we and read by alumna Lis Taylo (NC 1974-77) at the 1969-74 A Afternoon Tea as part of the The following speech was written and read by alumna Lis Taylor (NC 1974-77) at the 1969-74 Alumni Back to New weekend:

> an I say firstly what a wonderful thrill it is to be back at New College and to be able to attend the 50th anniversary of the College. It's hard to believe that it is 45 years since I first became a resident of New College. I entered New College in 1974 as part of the first group of 26 female residents. I was a 17 year old country girl straight out of high school having competed the HSC at Tamworth High School. I remember being driven to Sydney by my parents along with 2 fellow students from Tamworth High, Sue Mountain (now Lockart) and Jane Utting. From memory I believe we were in Group 2A.

What was it like to be in the first group of women?

Certainly I remember feeling very outnumbered by the number of men in the College and I wonder if there was a feeling from the males of trepidation that the bastion of masculinity for 5 years would be changed forever. Melissa Lavelle wrote in the 1974 edition of the New College magazine: 'February 2. The fortress surrenders and we enter smiling in our full force of 18. Attack begins upon the western, northern and eastern fronts and in no time at all, 2A, 2B and 2C fall beneath our platform shoes. Surrender terms are signed, and we are regarded (looked over) warily by the male battalions. The male forces are thrown into utter confusion. Amidst the dust of battle a change is taking place. It is a strange but undeniable fact that between males and females there is an uncanny difference... and even the most myopic engineer can appreciate the deviations.'

Of course there is a good deal of poetic license in that assessment of women becoming part of the New College culture. My memory is that the integration happened quite easily, without battles and quickly women were part of the fabric and landscape of the College, included in all the sporting and social activities that New is famous for. By 1976 the number of women in the College had doubled and as I wrote in the magazine of that year 'with such a positive reaction our numbers have at least doubled, and we have successfully infiltrated all



floors and fronts of the College.' Continuing with the tongue in cheek battle fortress metaphor.

Memories

There are so many memories. Foundation Days lunching at tables on the median strip in Anzac Parade and flour being hurled at passing traffic. Is that still allowed? There was pram racing and scavenging to earn points to beat Basser, Baxter and Goldstein Colleges. Justin Peters was one of the Foundation Day Directors.

Garden Nights were an annual New College tradition of stage entertainment with lots of fun acts which were planned and dress rehearsals held before the big night. They quite often showcased dance and drama performances from the international students which was a real privilege to see.

Water fights using any garbage bin that could be found were a major feature of New College life, and didn't discriminate between the male and females.

Sport involvement was very much supported and encouraged with many proud achievements for the College across a wide range of sports. I was very involved in the women's tennis team, squash, volleyball and at times the women's hockey team. I loved this aspect of life at New College.

With all these activities you would wonder how we ever managed to study. But I think most people managed to successfully complete their degrees despite all the other distractions.

I remember lots of very extrovert characters, Bill Barwick, Dave Bard, Grant Lockart, Paul Robinson, Graham Frauenfelder, Phil Piggin, Christine Olding, Elaine Dunn and Judy Nicholson to name a few. Many people found their future partners through New College and many of you would well know the Lockart/Mountain dynasty at New.

The kitchen food was an ever present source of complaint I seem to remember, where we lined up for rather questionable cuisine, often featuring cabbage and other uninteresting dishes. The year I entered the Nationwide caterers were replaced by what we called SMIRSH, however lots of groans still remained. This was well before the era of gourmet style cooking that we are now accustomed to.

Reflections from one of the College's original residents

The Rev Dr Stuart Barton Babbage was the Master of the College along with his wife Elizabeth. They would attend sporting activities to support the College teams and participate to support the College teams and participate and their young family.

New College had its fair share of shenanigans, like building a replica of an F111 fighter jet with steel concrete reinforcing purloined from the Warrane College building site next door for a Foundation Day float.

We were on a journey into maturity. At the beginning of each academic year, a new community forms. People grow and develop, change and adapt, then at the end of the year some move on into other communities. The remaining community regroups to embrace its new members and the journey into maturity begins once more with fresh dynamics.

Leaving and seeing others leave can be a bittersweet experience. You share in a period of intense academic, personal and professional growth and then move on, going our separate ways. We may make a few life-long friends from our days at College but rarely do we see the full flowering of the mature person.

But the journey into maturity does happen: the student who drank a schooner faster than Bob Hawke became a responsible lawyer; the student who ran naked to Coogee Beach became a reliable engineer; and the student who organised a formal dinner in the middle of Anzac Parade became a minister and teacher to students of theology."

Of-course these were the Whitlam years and the first year of women at New was even before the 1975 Australian constitutional crisis when the Prime Minister was sacked by the Governor General. The Vietnam War was still raging and did not end until April 1975. College had quite a number of Vietnamese students as well as Colombo plan students from Sri Lanka, Thailand, Indonesia, Singapore and many others parts of Asia. The culture of New College was very inclusive and multi-cultural and it was wonderful to share stories with the international friends I made at New. One memory I have is of taking two of my Vietnamese friends home with me to Tamworth which was a wonderful experience for us in learning about each other's family and culture. I leant how to make Vietnamese short soup and

The Master was part of a hilarious skit at one of the Garden nights. They also hosted weekly formal dinners where we regularly heard wonderful, eminent speakers on an array of topics. One such speaker I particularly remember was Donald Horne speaking, who authored 'The Lucky Country'. The Deputy Master and Dean of Men was Associate Professor Phil Grouse who also lived in the College in a flat downstairs with his wife Margaret and their family. I remember between the Babbages and the Grouses they would host people in their residences for bible studies and suppers on Sunday evenings. As it was the first time women were admitted into College, a Dean of Women was appointed, Dr Ruth White who was available to support women during their College stay.

What did you value or appreciate about your time at College?

What I valued about New College is the wonderful foundation it has laid for my view of the world. I think the inclusive and multi-cultural aspect of the College was very influential in giving me a love and respect for other cultures, languages and traditions which I carry with me in my everyday work. I think we were able to strike a positive balance between having lots of fun but also getting our studies done at the same time."



RESEARCH AFTERNOON TEA






CV's 10th Anniversary Celebrations kicked off with a Research Afternoon Tea and warm words from guest speakers Professor Nicholas Fisk (UNSW Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research)), alumnus Adam Carr (NCV 2009), and current residents Hira Syeda and Matt Bagg.

Hira, who has lived in NCV since 2016 shared that she had only just handed in her Ph.D. thesis in Computer Science Engineering that week! A very excited and stress-free Hira went on to speak of her invaluable experiences at NCV, sharing how "diversity and inclusion are a constituent part of NCV culture". Matt Bagg, resident since 2015 and Senior Academic Tutor in 2018, is in his final year of his Ph.D. on pain and physiotherapy. He shared about leading the progression of fortnightly NCV Research Seminars, where residents doing research could grow in their ability to present and talk about themselves and their work, calling NCV a "melting pot of opportunity for cross-disciplinary interaction." Matt's work as the Senior Academic Tutor last year has seen the level of research support offered at NCV advance considerably.

Alumnus Dr Adam Carr (NCV 2009) did his Ph.D. on supercritical fluids, and spoke of how his research was unusually but beautifully applied to



the coffee industry. Adam is now Head of the Coffee Science & Education Centre at Seven Miles, an Australian award-winning coffee roasting company. He provided some delicious fresh coffee from Seven Miles at the afternoon tea, and spoke on 'Embracing the Unexpected'. As one of the first Chemical Engineers in coffee roasting, Adam passed on wise words from his professor: "Don't ever see failure as a roadblock, but as a potential opportunity to start something new and grow yourself." Adam was the first resident of NCV to be conferred with a Ph.D.

And final guest speaker Professor Nicholas Fisk, whose research lies in Developmental Biology and Maternal Foetal Medicine, passed on congratulations and well wishes on behalf of the Vice-Chancellor of UNSW, and commended NCV for its profound academic achievement and community in just 10 years. Before then unveiling NCV's new Honour Boards celebrating the 78 NCV alumni who have so far received doctorates, Professor Fisk finished with the following motivating words: "On campus communities and intellectual stimulation is really important, not just to the degree you receive, but in how you spend your formative years, which will ultimately pay off intellectually and through friendships for the rest of your lives."

DUAL UNIVERSITY MEDALLIST



n January 29th, NCV Senior Resident Jonathan Hopkins (NCV 2018-present) was awarded not one, but two University Medals. Jonathan not only managed to receive the 2018 University Medal for Chemical Engineering but also for Materials Engineering. New n Old recently asked some questions of this impressive wizz!

What do you find most satisfying about studying Chemical Engineering and Materials Engineering?

Studying both Chemical Engineering and Materials Engineering gave me a very broad scope of knowledge, ranging from mathematical modelling and designing process equipment to learning about fracture mechanics (the science of why things break), corrosion, and even philosophy in engineering ethics! I think the most satisfying aspect of studying Chemical and Materials Engineering was seeing how all these different subjects came together in solving problems in research and industry. For example, in Chemical Engineering I undertook a group design project where, using almost everything we had learned in our previous courses, we designed a processing plant to convert brewery waste products into renewable biogas – a difficult task, but very rewarding!

Have you got any ideas yet on how you'd like to apply the skills you're learning from your degree programs when you enter the workforce?

I have a keen interest in polymer research and am hoping to start a career in academia in this field. This year I am commencing my Ph.D. in Materials Science and Engineering at UNSW, where I will be synthesizing polymers that conduct electricity and have numerous potential applications in electronics and biomedical engineering.

What would you say to someone considering studying an engineering course at UNSW?

Engineering is a very rewarding field of study, especially if you're already interested in science and maths and want to learn more about how they're applied to solve real-world problems. It also opens the door to a huge range of opportunities in the workforce, including process plant design, project management, consulting, and cutting-edge fundamental and industry-based research – so there's something for people of all interests.

Why did you apply to live at NCV and what have you gained from living in the community?

I moved into NCV for my final undergraduate year and Honours thesis; living close to UNSW and the research lab alleviated the need to travel long distances to and from university, which allowed me to devote more time to my studies and research. At NCV I have really appreciated being part of a studious community with many opportunities to connect with like-minded individuals from all over the world. I have especially enjoyed hearing about other residents' postgraduate research at the fortnightly Research Meetings and spending time with fellow Christians at the NCV Bible studies and Christian services.

Could you tell us what you are looking forward to about being on the Senior Resident Team?

This year is my first year as a Senior Resident (SR) at NCV, and even though I've only been on the team for a few weeks so far, I'm already enjoying meeting new people and planning out activities for the year ahead with the rest of the SR team. I'm especially looking forward to continuing to build friendships and contributing to social events and the overall sense of community at NCV.

bi-annual World Indigenous Law Conference
at Windsor University in Ontario, Canada.
The Conference brings together many people from
various areas of the legal profession and local
Indigenous communities, as well as any who are
interested, to share in conversations pertaining to
Indigenous peoples and the law. The 2018 Conference,
titled Waawiiatanong Ziibi: Where the River Bends - The
Application of Indigenous Laws in Indigenous Communities
and in the Courts, focussed on the implementation
of Indigenous Law into western contemporary legal
systems, highlighting Indigenous Laws that already
exist in Indigenous communities and Nations.

Renee, a Bundjalung woman from the Gold Coast completing her Juris Doctor at UNSW, was one of two UNSW students to receive funding from the NSW Bar Association to attend the Conference. The opportunity was a dream come true for Renee, who told New N Old how this area of the law has been a particular interest of hers for some time:

"the effects of colonization on First Nations people, although similar, differ throughout the world, and how each nation deals with the issues streaming from Colonization is really interesting and important. At the Conference, I particularly enjoyed the speakers from New Zealand and also North America, who addressed how they are dealing with issues of Native Title within their legal systems".

Renee also noted how her own upbringing has meant that, naturally, Indigenous peoples and the legal system has led to her interest being a deeply personal one:

"I was fortunate to grow up around law. My parents met me in Canada to attend the conference as well. My dad, Chris Emzin, in one of only 16 Aboriginal Australia Barristers, so growing up I was privileged to have him as a role model and his influence definitely shaped my decision to study law."

Another factor which shaped Renee's decision to study law, strengthening her interest in human rights for First Nations people specifically, was her time at Melbourne University meeting Indigenous people from all over the country. It was during this time that Renee was able to hear many stories and learn about issues affecting Aboriginal people from all over Australia.

The NCV community eagerly awaits all that lies ahead for Renee as she pursues her passion of seeking justice and protection for Indigenous peoples through the legal system in Australia and around the world.

about 20 controls, or 'checkpoints'." Pat managed to have the fastest accumulative time for the Junior Elite Under 20 and Underage Class.

JWOC has a week long program with races of all the different disciplines: sprint, a middle qualification and final, a long distance course and a relay. Australia will send 6 men and women, 20 years and under, to race against all other competing countries. Pat also qualified last year, leading him to compete in Hungary.

Pat first became interested in orienteering in primary school through an introductory Teams' Orienteering Series in Canberra called Map Mates. Since then, he has done about as much orienteering as he can around Australia, New Zealand and even Europe. Pat shares, "I think the awesome thing about orienteering is how it combines both a physical and mental test, and that every race is a different challenge, in different terrain,

How do Chinese people living across the world become localised to their new countries and yet retain their cultural identity? This is the question New College alumnus and current NCV Resident Fellow, Wah Guan Lim (NC 2002-06), seeks to explore in his upcoming book "Denationalising Identities: The Politics of Culture and Performance in the Chinese Diaspora" (working title). Denationalising Identities, a conversion of Guan's Ph.D. thesis, takes a look

at dramatic responses to Chinese identity formation, particularly in 1980s theatre from China, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Singapore.

As Guan owes what he calls an "intellectual debt" to Taiwan, it is no surprise that he has chosen to spend his sabbatical there from May-September, with hopes to finish



off his book. Upon his return, Guan will resume lecturing in Chinese language, literature, drama and film at UNSW, and also reunite with the research community at NCV, who will be missing Guan from their fortnightly seminars!



In this landmark series, the Anglican and Catholic Archbishops will articulate the importance and relevance of faith, hope and love for contemporary Australian society at a time when competing voices and institutions wrestle to define and influence the national conversation.
